of Proposition C - Health Care

A “**yes**” vote will amend Missouri law to deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services. The amendment will also modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies.

A “**no**” vote will not change the current Missouri law regarding private health insurance, lawful healthcare services, and the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies.

If passed, this measure will have no impact on taxes.

Proposition 2 -- Elected Assessor -- St. Louis County

Ballot Description: "Shall the Charter of St. Louis County be amended by providing for the election of the St. Louis County Assessor, as set forth in Exhibit A of Ordinance No. 24,382 on file with the St. Louis County Administrative Director and the St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners?" St. Louis County voters will consider amending the county charter so they can elect an assessor. Currently, the assessor is an appointed civil servant who works under the director of revenue.

Property tax assessments have been controversial in the county in the past decade.

Pro argument: electing the assessor would make the assessor more accountable to the people.

Con argument: The current system has been in place since 1960 because voters thought the former elected assessor model was too political and lacked professionalism.

The county vote in August is ahead of a statewide vote in November on a constitutional amendment to require St. Louis County to elect an assessor. The county charter amendment includes details –such as the term and qualifications for the office - of a transition from an appointed assessor to an elected one.

The statewide proposal amends only the county home rule section of the state Constitution to require the county to elect an assessor.

County officials have said the charter amendment gives county voters an opportunity

to make their preference known before the statewide vote.

Under the charter amendment, an elected assessor must live in the county for two years before winning the position. The measure calls for electing an assessor next April who would serve until Dec. 31, 2014. Starting in November of that year, voters would elect assessors who would serve four-year terms.

The assessor would be elected at the same time as the county executive and prosecuting attorney.

The county executive would fill a vacancy in the office with someone of the same political party as the assessor who left the position. Voters would elect someone to fill the remainder of the unexpired term at the next general election.

Nov. 6 Ballot Constitutional Amendment 1

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to require the office of county assessor to be an elected position in all counties with a charter form of government, except counties with a population between 600,001-699,999?"

It is estimated this proposal will have no costs or savings to state or local governmental entities."

PROP. C - STATE-WIDE ISSUE (Proposed by MO. General Assembly)

"Shall the Missouri Statutes be amended to: Deny the government authority to penalize citizens for refusing to purchase private health insurance or infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services? Modify laws regarding the liquidation of certain domestic insurance companies? It is estimated this proposal will have no immediate costs or savings to state or local governmental entities. However, because of the uncertain interaction of the proposal with implementation of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, future costs to state governmental entities are unknown."

Lawmakers are asking voters to adopt a law that would prevent a mandate in the new federal health care law (The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act) which would require most Americans to have insurance or face penalties beginning in 2014.

The measure would prohibit the federal government from enforcing in Missouri anything that would "infringe upon the right to offer or accept direct payment for lawful healthcare services."

Supporters of the measure say the mandate encroaches on personal liberty and violates the U.S. Constitution.

Opponents say: Proposition C is unconstitutional and would not be binding legally if it passes. Federal law trumps state law, they say. (see p. 8 for additional information.)

In addition to State-wide candidates, Congress, State Senate (even numbered districts) and State Representative candidates, City of St. Louis voters will also have on their ballot the following issue and candidates. Those selecting the nonpartisan ballot will have only Proposition S and State Proposition C.

St. Louis Public Schools **Proposition S** -- \$155 million bond issue

Ballot Description:

Shall the Special Administrative Board of the Transitional School District of the City of St. Louis borrow money in the amount of One Hundred Fifty Five Million Dollars (\$155,000,000) for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, renovating, repairing, improving, furnishing and equipping school sites, buildings and related facilities in the District, including but not limited to

- (1) removing lead paint and other hazardous materials at affected schools,
- (2) upgrading technology to modernize classrooms and improve academic performance,
- (3) improving building conditions and security systems to increase student safety and security,
- (4) upgrading school kitchens to improve student health, and
- (5) improving school playgrounds and athletic fields and facilities, and issue general obligation bonds for the payment thereof, resulting in no estimated increase in the debt service property tax levy? If this proposition is approved, the adjusted debt service levy of the school district is estimated to remain unchanged at the current rate of \$0.6211 per one hundred dollars assessed valuation of real and personal property.

PURPOSE:

The district wants to use the money to upgrade such items as science labs, libraries, pre-kindergarten classrooms. The bonds would pay for projects that would upgrade the electrical infrastructure to support classroom computers, enhance school safety and security, abate lead, asbestos and mold, renovate kitchens and enhance sports facilities.

The district maintains 74 school buildings, which include more than 7 million square feet, a supporter's brochure says. Their ages range from 6 to 132 years old; most are more than 75 years old, the brochure says.

The district can use federal stimulus money to reduce interest costs. Officials say property taxes would not increase. But taxpayers would pay a debt service tax for more years.

The bond issue needs a **four-sevenths favorable majority to pass.**

FROM THE EDITOR

I had an exciting opportunity in early June. Once again after many years, I represented the St. Louis League at the League of Women Voters of the U.S. National Convention in Atlanta. While I hadn't attended a League convention in more than a decade, it was easy to conclude: the more things change, the more they stay the same – that describes a League national convention. Still early a.m. to late into the evening meetings, enthusiastic delegates, well-thought-out presentations, enlightening workshops and caucuses and great people – both women and men.

The National League of Women Voters 49th convention in its 90th year brought together more than 600 League delegates to chart the course for the League for the next two years and further into the future. It was an exciting five-day meeting that reinforced after 90 years the League continues as a major-league player impacting government.

Attended by six St. Louis League members, the convention adopted two new studies: 1) the role of the federal government in education policy-making, with possible consideration of funding, common standards and/or governance relationships among all levels of government and 2) a study of privatization: the policy agenda to transfer government functions, services and assets to the private sector.

Focuses included recruiting and involving young members and the League in the ever-changing world, in particular in the age of technology and social media. Workshops topics included "Promoting Productive Public Discourse Online" and "Using Online Tools to Connect With Your Community".

A highlight of the meeting was a panel composed of all former national League presidents who spoke about the highlights of their terms in office -- truly an inspirational look at League history.

Delegates adopted program, resolutions, amendments to the bylaws, approved the 2010-11 budget, including an increase in the per-member payment by local Leagues to the national League, and elected the 2010-2012 board of directors. Elisabeth MacNamera of Atlanta, elected 18th president of the LWVUS, also serves as chair of the LWV Education Fund. Former St. Louis area League member and president of the LWV Missouri of Columbia, MO, Elaine Blodgett, was elected Nominating Committee Chairman.
